Strategies For Success

With a focus on equity and inclusion, we continue to intentionally engage historically under-resourced and marginalized communities because we know that everyone doesn't have the same access to opportunities and social capital. ADVANCE

Through partnerships with school districts and community partners, we have grown our student impact numbers and provided more students with access to JA's experiential learning programs.



JA Capstone Programs

Students visit the Capdevilla Gillespie Center for Junior Achievement to participate in our unique, "realworld" simulation learning experiences. Sudents work, mange, and shop at mini-store fronts modeled after local businesses while learning how to manage money, explore different career pathways, and gain an understanding of how the economy operates.

JA High School Experiences


High school programs such as JA Company Program and JA Stock Market Challenge begin with inclass curriculum that culminates into countywide students events where students showcase their newfound knowledge through friendly competitions. In the 2022 Company Program, one San Diego team had the opportunity to participate in the national competition at the JA USA National Leadership Summit held in Washington DC.

ADAPT

JA is adapting curriculum to enable young people to participate JA's unique experiential learning programs directly to accomodate students whose schools do not implement JA into their classrooms.

Workforce Development Experiences

JA Ambassadors and our spring and summer high school workforce development program encourage students to explore career pathways and begin developing their work readiness skillsets. Students are introduced to mentors in the business community through career panels and job shadows.



Community Based Programs

To accommodate for students whose schools do not implement popular JA programs into their curriculum, JA has modified programs to enable students to participate in JA's experiential programs such as the McGrath Family JA BizTown and JA Stock Market Challenge. Freelance Day in JA BizTown provides students the opportunity experience our one-of-a-kind BizTown simulation. JA Stock Market Pop Up allows high school students to gain investing exerpience in a simulated stock market.

JA FELLOWS

JA San Diego is focused on two key factors toward economic mobility – the development of essential skills and the connection to social capital. Our investment in teens is a direct investment in our future economy, JA San Diego is providing intentional experiential opportunities for high school students that bridge together education and business and connect students directly to the future workforce. Our programs create a risk-free environment for students to grow their way into success, developing young leaders with self-efficacy, and resiliency to adapt to their environments.

JA programs guided by our three pillars – financial literacy, entrepreneurship, and career readiness – empower youth with the skills to not only improve their lives but bolster their families, their communities, and our nation.

Spring Semester

The first cohort of JA Fellows launched spring semester at Lincoln High School. Composed of 36 students, JA Fellows connected students to the San Diego business community through a year-long leadership, work-based learning experience and professional mentorship.

Students meet for daily instruction as part of their school schedule where they recieve lessons in personal finance and college and career readiness. The first semester of the program is primarily focused on developing work readiness skills and providing career exploration opportunities. Career panels are hosted during class time and students attend field trips to on-site job shadows to learn about the different careers in their local economy.



Fall Semester

During the second semester, students are connect to internships with local businesses to gain handson experience into a career path or industry they are interested in pursuing. JA San Diego partnered with a range of businesses from large corporations to small business from the nonprofit industries to the life sciences to the food industry.
